### Coloplast for Security

The ideal size to cut an aperture is about 2-3mm larger than the actual stoma (Rust, 2007) and the same shape, which is generally circular for an end stoma and oval for a loop stoma. After about eight weeks, pre-cut apertures can be used if the stoma is circular in shape (Thompson et al, 2011).

### **High Impact Actions for Nursing Midwifery The Essential ...**

Recent systematic reviews suggest that a stoma has a negative impact on quality of life (QOL) [3-5], and patients with a stoma report difficulties in work and social situations, with sexuality and body image, and with stoma function [6, 7]. In addition, complications are common and can exacerbate quality of life issues . Interventions are therefore needed that have the potential to both reduce the risk of complication, and improve QOL for this group of patients.
